A CHARLES II GILTWOOD MIRROR

England, *circa* 1680 SOLD

An exceptionally rare Charles II Baroque giltwood frame of magnificent proportions. The rectangular mirror plate surrounded by an inner frame of ribbon-tied berried laurel leaves - the outstanding external framework festooned with scrolling carved foliage and flowers in wonderfully exhuberant form, the cresting surmounted by a carved parrot flanked by a pair of winged putti, the sides and base similarly carved with winged putti amongst the foliate scrolls. Retaining its original gilding.

Mirrors of this type were normally gilded with silver-leaf - primarily due to the huge expense of the finish - really unusually the gilding analysis undertaken showed that this frame was originally gilded with gold leaf (not silver) which underlines the importance and huge cost incurred in the original commission.
